

Does the new rule apply to me?

This applies to ALL peer-reviewed journal articles resulting from NIH-funded activities, if your article is accepted on or after April 7, 2008. It applies to all authors of such articles, whether or not a principal investigator.

Why did the NIH do this?

The NIH wants tax-supported research to be available to the people who paid for it.

The new NIH Public Access policy took effect on April 7, 2008. NIH requires that an author's final version of any peer-reviewed journal article resulting from NIH-funded activities be submitted to the PubMed Central (PMC) repository, where it will be made available to the public no later than 12 months after the journal article is published.

What is required for compliance?

Before you publish: Copyright

You must ensure that any agreement with your publisher permits the submission of your manuscript to NIH.

Look up your journal or publishers' policies via JEFFLINE. Notify your publisher when you submit the article that it is subject to the NIH Public Access policy.

JEFFLINE also provides sample contract addenda and links to examples of wording you can add to a publisher's agreement to ensure that you can fulfill the NIH policy. AISR staff can answer questions and assist with identifying journal policies.

After your article is accepted: Submission of your manuscript

For manuscripts accepted for publication on or after April 7, 2008, Jefferson authors must submit the final version of the manuscript, and accompanying files, to the NIH Manuscript Submission System (NIHMS).

Some publishers will submit the article for you as a service, but may charge a fee for it. NIH direct deposit is FREE. See JEFFLINE for a list of publishers who

submit. You may submit the manuscript yourself or may designate a third party in your lab or department to submit it.

AISR staff will submit the manuscript for you, at your request. Some publishers require that you add a statement to your article, to clarify that it is not the final published version.

When you prepare NIH applications, proposals, or progress reports:

Citing PubMed Central ID numbers

When your manuscript is submitted to NIH you will receive a NIHMS ID number, and once it is available in PubMed Central, it will be assigned a PMC ID number.

Effective May 25, 2008, you must cite the PMC ID or NIHMS ID numbers for any articles you cite in your progress reports, new applications, and renewals. These are only needed for articles accepted for publication on or after April 7, 2008, but you may include PMC ID numbers for articles already in PubMed Central as well. These are NOT the same as regular PubMed ID numbers. AISR staff will help you find these numbers, if you need assistance.
